Notes to Financial Statements

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- A. American Standard Insurance Company of Ohio (the Company) prepares its statutory financial statements in accordance with accounting practices prescribed or permitted by the Office of the Commissioner of Insurance of the State of Ohio (OCI). Prescribed statutory accounting practices include the National Association of Insurance Commissioners' (NAIC) "Accounting Practices and Procedures Manual", version effective March 1, 2011, as well as state laws, regulations, and general administrative rules applicable to all insurance enterprises domiciled in a particular state. In addition, the OCI has a right to permit other specific practices that may deviate from prescribed practices. No permitted differences in statutory accounting practices between the OCI and the NAIC are used in the preparation of these statutory financial statements
- B. The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the Annual Statement Instructions and Accounting Practices and Procedures manual requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses. It also requires estimates in the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from these estimates.
- C. Premiums, reserves and expenses are accounted for in accordance with the NAIC Accounting Practices and Procedures manual, subject to deviations prescribed or permitted by the State of Ohio as described above.

In addition, the Company uses the following accounting policies:

- (1) Investments in short-term bonds rated "1" (highest quality), or "2" (high quality) by the Securities Valuation Office ("SVO") of the NAIC are reported in the financial statements at amortized cost. Bonds rated "3" (medium quality), "4" (low quality), "5" (lower quality), or "6" (lowest quality) by the SVO are reported at the lower of amortized cost or fair value. The interest method is used to amortize any purchase premium or discount, including estimates of future prepayments obtained from independent sources. Money Market Mutual Funds are recorded at amortized cost, which approximates fair market value.
- (2) Investments in bonds rated "1" (highest quality), or "2" (high quality) by the Securities Valuation Office ("SVO") of the NAIC are reported in the financial statements at amortized cost. Bonds rated "3" (medium quality), "4" (low quality), "5" (lower quality), or "6" (lowest quality) by the SVO are reported at the lower of amortized cost or fair value. Investments in commercial mortgage backed securities (CMBS) and non-agency residential mortgage backed securities (RMBS) utilize a two step process to obtain a valuation and rating in accordance with SSAP 43R, *Loan Backed and Structured Securities*. The first step derives a rating for valuation by comparing the current amortized cost to the modeled range of values assigned to the six NAIC designations for each security. This determines whether the securities are stated at the lower of amortized cost or fair value per the above rules. The second step utilizes the same modeled range of values to derive a rating for reporting using the current carrying value as determined in the first step.

Ratings and valuations for investments in asset backed securities that are otherwise rated by an accredited ratings organization (ARO) or the SVO are calculated using a two step process. The first step derives a rating for valuation based on the ARO or SVO rating and the NAIC model valuation table. The second step utilizes the model valuation table to derive a rating for reporting using the current carrying value as determined in the first step. Securities whose initial rating is NAIC 1 or NAIC 6 in step one are not further modified by step two. The interest method is used to amortize any purchase premium or discount, including estimates of future prepayments obtained from independent sources.

- (3) The Company holds no common stocks.
- (4) The Company holds no preferred stocks.
- (5) The Company holds no mortgage loans.
- (6) The Company holds no loan-backed securities.
- (7) Investments in subsidiary, controlled and affiliated companies are stated as follows: The Company is wholly owned by AMFAM Inc., a holding company, which is wholly owned by American Family Mutual Insurance Company (AFMIC).
- (8) The Company has no investments in joint ventures, partnerships and limited liability.
- (9) The Company holds no derivatives.
- (10) The Company does anticipate investment income as a factor in premium deficiency calculations.
- (11) Unpaid losses and loss adjustment expenses include an amount determined from individual case estimates and loss reports and an amount, based on past experience, for losses incurred but not reported. Such liabilities are necessarily based on assumptions and estimates and while management believes the amounts are adequate, the ultimate liability may be in excess of or less than the amount provided. The methods for making such estimates are continually reviewed and any adjustments are reflected in the period determined.
- (12) The Company has not modified its capitalization policy during the current reporting period.
- (13) The Company does not have pharmaceutical rebate receivables.

Notes to Financial Statements

2. ACCOUNTING CHANGES AND CORRECTIONS OF ERRORS

During 2011 the Company modified its accounting policy for reinsurance contracts. Under the modified policy, the estimated full value of a reinsurance contract is recorded as written premium assumed or ceded at the inception of the agreement. Reinsurance premium payable (receivable) is recorded on ceded (assumed) reinsurance to the extent cash has not been paid (received). Unearned premiums are recognized (earned) as the reinsurance protection is provided over the coverage period. The Company applied the modified policy prospectively on April 1, 2011, for all reinsurance contracts in place as of and entered into after that date. This accounting policy modification had no impact on the balance sheet, no impact on income statement recognition, and no impact on surplus in 2011. Had the policy been applied retrospectively, there would have been no impact as of December 31, 2010.

The Company participates with AFMIC and its subsidiaries (herein referred to as the "Companies") in non-contributory pension plans (herein referred to as the "Plans") covering substantially all employees. All employees providing services to the Companies are employees of AFMIC. The Company is not directly liable for obligations under the Plans. For employees hired before January 1, 2009, and District Managers hired before January 1, 2010, the benefits are based on years of credited service and highest average compensation (as defined in the Plans). For employees hired on or after January 1, 2009, benefits are determined under a cash balance formula (as defined in the Plans). Beginning January 1, 2011, District Managers are referred to as Agency Sales Managers. Managers who were accruing pension benefits under the final average pay formula in the District Managers Plan began participating, and accruing pension benefits under the final average pay formula in the employee plan for their services performed on or after January 1, 2011. This change in the benefit accrual was accounting for as a plan curtailment in 2010. Managers hired on or after January 1, 2010, participate, and accrue pension benefits under the cash balance formula in the employee plan. The asset valuation method used in 2011 for funding calculations is the Two-Year Smoothed Value method. The new benefit restrictions, required under the Pension Protection Act of 2006, do not apply in 2012 given the funded status of the plans. Pension expense of approximately \$187,321 and \$38,794 was allocated to the Company for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, based on the Company's overall salary percentage.

The Companies also participate in a qualified contributory 401(k) plan (herein referred to as the "Plan"). Substantially all employees are eligible to enter into the Plan. Employee participation in the Plan is optional; participants contribute at least one percent, but no more than 30 percent of base compensation, subject to Internal Revenue Service limitations. The Companies are required to make contributions each payroll period, as defined, to a trust fund. Company contributions are based on a formula with a dollar-for-dollar match on the first 3% of eligible contributions plus 50 cents per dollar on the next 2% of eligible contributions. The maximum annual company contribution is 4% of eligible contributions. The Plan expense allocated to the Company during 2011 and 2010 amounted to \$72,524 and \$15,265, respectively, based on the Company's overall salary percentage.

Beginning on Jan. 1, 2011, Agency Sales Managers (formerly known as District Managers) began receiving an employer fixed match each pay period. This fixed match is the same as the employee match, as discussed above.

The Companies provide certain health care benefits to certain grandfathered agents and substantially all employees. In addition, the Companies provide most employees with a life insurance benefit. Upon retirement, agents and employees are eligible to continue certain of these benefits. Except for certain grandfathered individuals, retired employees and agents contribute to the health care plan an amount intended to fully provide for the covered benefits. For those grandfathered retirees in the health care plan, the Companies previously absorbed a portion of the annual cost. Beginning on January 1, 2010, the subsidy for those grandfathered agent retirees was discontinued. Beginning on January 2, 2011, the subsidy for those grandfathered employee retirees was discontinued. For the life insurance program, the Companies absorb substantially all the cost. The Company also contributes toward eligible employees' postretirement health care using a fixed amount for each year of eligible service. The Companies' portions of the costs of these programs are unfunded. The Companies sponsor no other significant postretirement benefit plans. The remaining cost to the Company was not significant in 2010 or 2009.


