# Notes to Financial Statement

## 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies and Going Concern

### A. Accounting Policies

The financial statements of Oscar Buckeye State Insurance Corporation are present on the bases of accounting practices prescribed or permitted by the Ohio Department of Insurance (ODI).

The Ohio Department of Insurance recognizes only statutory accounting practices prescribed or permitted by the State of Ohio for determining and reporting the financial condition and results of operations of an insurance company, for determining its solvency under the Ohio Insurance Law. 
