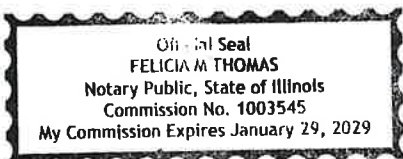

Notes to the Financial Statements

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies and Going Concern

A. Accounting Practices

The accompanying financial statements of Infinity Safeguard Insurance Company (the "Company" or "ISAFIC") have been prepared in conformity with the National Association of Insurance Commissioners ("NAIC") Annual Statement Instructions and *Accounting Practices and Procedures Manual* ("NAIC SAP"), and the laws of the State of Ohio.

The Ohio Department of Insurance ("ODOI") recognizes only statutory accounting practices prescribed or permitted by the state of Ohio for determining and reporting the financial condition and results of operations of an insurance company, and for determining its solvency under the Ohio Insurance Law. The NAIC SAP has been adopted as a component of prescribed or permitted practices by the State of Ohio. The Company has not adopted any prescribed or permitted accounting practices that differ from those found in the NAIC SAP, and accordingly, the Company has no prescribed or permitted accounting practices.

B. Use of Estimates in the Preparation of the Financial Statements

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the Statutory Accounting Principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities. It also requires the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expense during the period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

C. Accounting Policy

Premiums are earned over the terms of the related insurance policies and reinsurance contracts. Unearned premium reserves are established to cover the unexpired portion of premiums written. Such reserves are computed by pro rata methods for direct business and are based on reports received from ceding companies for reinsurance.

Expenses incurred in connection with acquiring new insurance business, including such acquisition costs as sales commissions and premium taxes, are charged to operations as incurred. Expenses incurred are reduced for ceding allowances received or receivable.

In addition, the Company uses the following accounting policies:

- (1) Short-term investments are stated at amortized value using the interest method. Short-term investments with a NAIC designation of 6 are stated at lower of amortized cost or fair value. Short-term investments include but are not limited to issuer credit obligations and commercial paper whose maturities at the time of purchase were greater than three months and less than one year. Cash and cash equivalents include money market instruments, cash on deposit and issuer credit obligations with maturities of three months or less from the date of purchase. Following are investments that are not classified a short-term investments or cash equivalent investments regardless of maturity date: asset-backed securities reported on Schedule D Part 1, Section 2, investments reported on Schedule BA, mortgage loans reported on Schedule B and derivatives reported on Schedule DB.
- (2) Issuer Credit Obligations ("ICO") with NAIC designations 1 or 2 are stated at amortized cost using the interest method. ICOs with NAIC designations of 3 through 6 are stated at the lower of amortized cost or fair value, with changes in fair value recorded in unassigned surplus as a change in net unrealized capital gains (losses) less tax. See paragraph 6 for asset-backed securities.
- (3) Common stocks are stated at fair market value with changes in fair value recorded as a change in net unrealized capital gains (losses) in unassigned surplus, except for investments in stocks of wholly owned uncombined subsidiaries and affiliates, which the Company carries on the equity basis.
- (4) Redeemable preferred stocks with NAIC designations of 1 and 2 are stated at amortized cost. Redeemable preferred stock with NAIC designations of 3 to 6 are stated at the lower of amortized cost or fair value. Perpetual preferred stocks are stated at fair value not to exceed currently effective call price.
- (5) Mortgage loans on real estate are stated at their unpaid principal balance.

Notes to the Financial Statements

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies and Going Concern (Continued)

- (6) U.S. government agency mortgage-backed securities are valued at amortized value. Other mortgage-backed securities which are modeled are valued at amortized value or fair value based on either a) the relationship of amortized value to the certain vendor-generated values or, b) credit ratings as assigned by the Structured Securities Group.

All other asset-backed securities are valued based upon their credit rating. NAIC designations of 1 or 2 are carried at amortized value, while NAIC designations 3 through 6 are carried at the lower of amortized value or fair value.

For high credit-quality asset-backed debt securities (NAIC designation 1.C or above), the amortized cost and effective yield of the securities are adjusted to reflect historical prepayment experience and changes in estimated future prepayments. The adjustments to amortized cost are recorded as a charge or credit to net investment income in accordance with the retrospective method. For all other asset-backed debt securities, the effective yield is adjusted prospectively for any changes in the estimated timing and amount of cash flows in accordance with the prospective method.

- (7) The Company has no related non-insurance companies.
- (8) Other invested assets consist of investments in joint ventures, partnerships and limited liability companies. The Company generally carries these interests based on the underlying audited GAAP equity of the investees.
- (9) The Company has no derivatives.
- (10) The Company anticipates investment income as a factor in the premium deficiency calculation, in accordance with SSAP NO. 53, Property-Casualty Contracts-Premiums.
- (11) Unpaid losses and loss adjustment expenses include an amount determined from individual case estimates and loss reports and an amount, based on past experience, for losses incurred but not reported. Such liabilities are necessarily based on assumptions and estimates and while management believes the amount is adequate, the ultimate liability may be in excess of or less than the amount provided. The methods for making such estimates and for establishing the resulting liabilities are continually reviewed and any adjustments are reflected in the period determined.
- (12) The Company has not modified its capitalization policy from the prior period.

As a result of this review, no asset-backed securities impairments were considered other-than-temporary.

The Company uses third party valuation service providers which are leading, nationally recognized providers of market data and analytics and utilize proprietary models that vary by asset class and incorporate available trade, bid and other market information when developing valuation information in the form of a single fair value for individual bond or equity security. 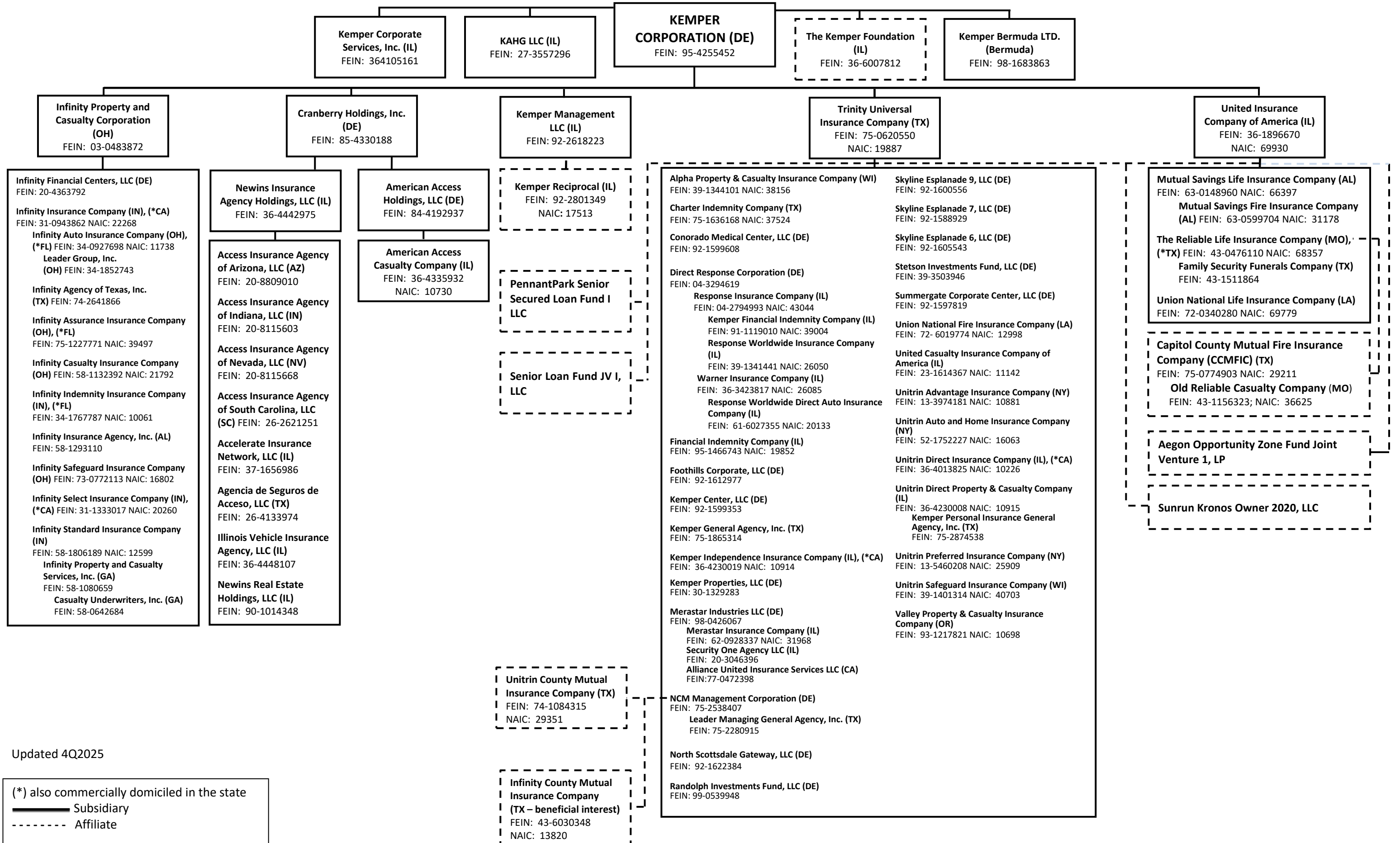
